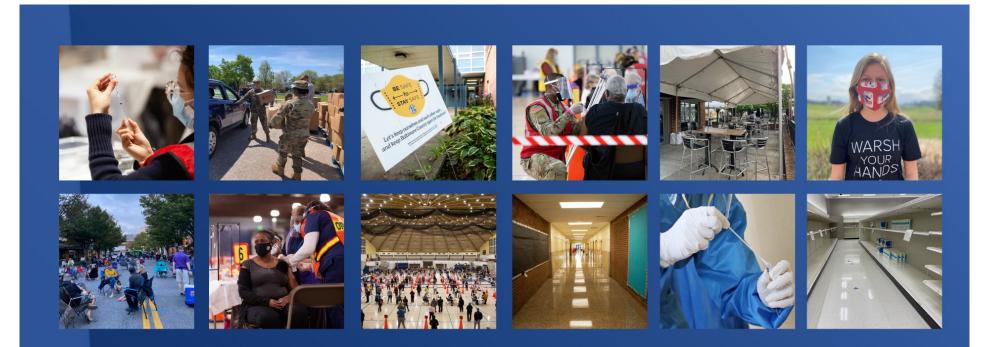

ROAD MAP to RECOVERY





State legislature passed the Blueprint for Maryland's Future, giving us additional resources to:

- **Expand early childhood education**
- Raise teacher pay
- Provide expanded career and technical training
- Provide additional investments in the classroom





- \$40 million over maintenance of effort
- \$192 million in new funds
- Budget preserves all teaching positions
- Step increases for BCPS staff and 2% mid-year COLA increase





COMMITMENT to EDUCATION

- Additional 15 minutes each day for student recovery
- Increasing support for the Community Eligibility Provision
- Funding new counselors and pupil personnel workers
- Reclassifying athletic directors as 12 month employees
- Additional **\$72 million** in federal funds



COMMITMENT to EDUCATION

\$67 million for construction of new Lansdowne High School

\$1.5 million to design an addition at Dundalk High School

ADDITIONAL INVESTMENTS:

- Deer Park Elementary (replacement)
- Summit Park Elementary (replacement)
- Red House Run Elementary (replacement)
- Scotts Branch Elementary (renovation & addition)

COMMITMENT to EDUCATION

THORE COLLEGE

Freezing in-county tuition to the Community College of Baltimore County

EXPAND:

- College Promise program by 500 students
- Early College Access for high school students
- Pathways in Technology Early College High School (P-TECH) programs





BUSINESS SUPPORT and ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

- Expanding Small Business Resource Center, Youth Works programming, Community Development Corporations, funding for tourism and main streets
- Creation of the Department of Housing and Community Development





EQUITY in RECOVERY

- Creation of Immigrant Affairs specialist
- Spending on Minority and Women-owned businesses has increased by 59% since 2018
- New positions to support contract compliance and certification reviews

PUBLIC SAFETY



- Continuing work with Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force
- Expanding access to behavioral and mental health services
- Enacted SMART Policing Act
- Expand body worn camera program to outfit entire department





- **\$16 million** towards new fire station and police substation at Tradepoint Atlantic
- Additional **\$7 million** towards new Wilkens Precinct
- \$1 million land aquisition for career fire station in Catonsville

PUBLIC SAFETY



- Community Outreach position within Fire Department
- Creation of Equity Officer and Medical Director roles
- \$1.5 million towards revolving loan fund
- \$4.5 million second set of turnout gear and commercial grade washers

VIBRANT COMMUNITIES



- Library System: Eliminate all overdue fines
- New senior center in northern Baltimore County
- Expansion to Woodlawn Senior Center
- Parking expansions to Cockeysville and Fleming Senior Centers

VIBRANT COMMUNITIES



- Funding for six additional code enforcement inspectors
- Proposing new revolving fund to address blighted properties
- Funding to support bulk trash pickup in early 2022

SUSTAINABILITY



\$2.4 million: Tree planting and maintenance

- \$400,000 Equitable tree planting
- \$500,000 Phase two of Climate Action Plan
- \$250,000 Green infrastructure programs
- Double the investment in "high performance home" and "energy conservation" tax credits

AGRICULTURAL PRESERVATION



\$5.3 million: Baltimore County Agricultural Program

- Additional \$600,000: Piney Rural Legacy program
- \$50,000: Development and transition at the Baltimore County Land Trust Alliance
- \$100,000 grant: Baltimore County Neighborspace

RECREATION and PARKS



- \$7 million (state and local funds):

 Development of park at Greens Lane
- \$14.5 million: Sparrows Point Park
- RENOVATIONS: Rockdale Park, Linover Park, Fleming Park, Diamond Ridge Family Park, and a destination playground at the Banneker Community Center

RECREATION and PARKS



- Turf fields at Parkville and Kenwood High Schools
- \$6 million lighted turf fields at Belfast Road
- NEW TRAIL SYSTEMS: Dundalk Heritage Trail, North Point Greenway Trail, Franklin Woodland Trail
- \$1 million to support the redevelopment of the Pikesville Armory

RECREATION and PARKS



- \$600,000 planning and feasibility studies of the Western Hills Community Park
- Improvements to Rocky Point Golf Course
- Second ice rink at Reisterstown Sportsplex

TRANSPORTATION and INFRASTRUCTURE



- Towson Circulator launching this year
- Bike Lanes: Campbell Boulevard, Bedford Avenue, Westland Boulevard
- Sidewalks: Ingleside Avenue,
 Seven Mile Lane, Windsor Mill Road
- Significant funding for road resurfacing and traffic calming

SUPPORTING our EMPLOYEES



- Full funding of steps and increments as well as a mid-year cost of living increase for all county employees
- County email accounts for *all* employees
- \$70 million towards retiree health care and life insurance benefits
- Expansion of tuition reimbursement program
- Granting 3 personal days for non-merit employees

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
